Upcoming Exams and Their Role in Student Development

As you know, during the academic year, various exams are regularly held in the Modern Education Complex named after Heydar Aliyev in order to monitor the learning outcomes of our students and the dynamics of the development of their academic knowledge. The subject teachers organize the Micro Summative Assessments, the administration organizes the Macro Summative Assessments, and starting from the new academic year, the Mock State Exams (In-School Assessment Tests) will be conducted. The progress will be tracked and discussed with the students. These exams help our students to develop a number of skills:

- Checking the level of knowledge: the assessment evaluates students' current knowledge in certain subjects, determines how well they have mastered the subject and which areas they need to improve.

- Promoting learning: exams encourage students to study and learn regularly. It helps students consolidate their knowledge and develop their learning skills.
- Increasing the sense of responsibility: preparing for exams develops students' sense of responsibility and proper time management skills. They understand that they have to reach a certain goal within certain time.
- Adapting to stress and pressure: exams teach students how to handle stressful situations and make decisions under pressure. These skills are useful in the future in work and personal life.
- Sense of success and self-confidence: as students succeed in exams, self-confidence increases and students become more confident in their knowledge and skills. This increases their academic motivation.

When handled correctly, exams are an important tool that supports not only students' academic knowledge, but also their personal development. Dear parents, taking all this into consideration, please ensure that your children are involved in the exams during the exam times. Thank you in advance.


Moreover, our students formed lasting friendships and meaningful relationships and connections. Through collaborative classes, social events and evening hangouts the students made enduring bonds with one another.

Formation of Healthy Lifestyle in Schoolchildren

Health is not only the absence of disease, but also the presence of complete physical, psychological and social well-being and an important indicator of biological characteristics, family relations, upbringing, and the quality of the environment. The school period is the most intensive growth and development stage for children. The habits they acquire during this period continue throughout their lives, which is why it is very important to form healthy lifestyle habits specifically during the school period.

A healthy lifestyle for school-aged children includes age-appropriate balanced nutrition, daily fluid intake, physical activity, a proper sleep schedule, maintaining personal hygiene, and minimizing screen exposure. A school-aged student should consume an age-appropriate amount of protein, fat, and carbohydrates throughout the day. The menu must include fruits and vegetables. It is recommended to minimize the consumption of fast and processed foods as much as possible.

A proper sleep routine is important for a student's active functioning throughout the day. Insomnia (lack of sleep) causes students to feel lethargic and tired, which lowers their ability to concentrate on lessons. Watching short videos or playing computer games at least two hours before bedtime negatively affects their sleep rhythm. Drinking a glass of warm water after waking up in the morning is very beneficial for digestive function. Consuming chocolate or any sweets on an empty stomach in the morning can disrupt your eating schedule and reduce your appetite throughout the day.


In recent times, a sedentary lifestyle among students has led to the development of serious conditions like obesity. To prevent this, physical activity must be a part of children's daily routines. Spending at least 3 hours outdoors, either walking or playing games, is essential for both their physical and mental well-being. Every parent wants their child to excel academically, and as a result, students are often enrolled in extracurricular activities in addition to school. However, this can lead to excessive overload during the day and a decrease in their ability to absorb information.

Therefore, in order to foster a healthy lifestyle and good habits in students, their daily schedule should balance both education and leisure time equally. From a young age, the examples set by parents in the family shape their children's future behavior, attitude towards themselves and their health, and overall lifestyle. Thus, parents should adhere to principles of a healthy lifestyle themselves and serve as role models for their children. Love, care, sincere relationships with parents, and positive communication within the family are fundamental to children's mental health.









Profile: Meet our Dance Teacher Ms. Turan Abdullayeva Interviewed by Mr. Nelson Urrego



NU-Good day Ms. Turan, how are you? Many thanks for accepting this invitation to connect and allowing the MTK community to know more about you.

TA- Good day, Mr. Nelson. I also thank you for your invitation. It is a great honour for me to work as a teacher-choreographer in the MTK community for a long time.

NU-It's hard to find an activity so exciting and engaging as dancing. How did you decide to become a Dance teacher?

TA- Since my family has a great passion for music and the arts, I began engaging in professional dance at a young age as a soloist in the " Benovshe" dance ensemble. For this reason, I completed my education at the Baku Choreography School, learning from well-known teachers and choreographers, including National Artists of the Republic of Azerbaijan. Their commitment to presenting the intricacies of national and world folk dances during lessons sparked a deep interest in me. From a young age, I envisioned myself as a professional, someone who loves their art, just like my teachers. These dreams and aspirations became a reality thanks to my supportive parents. Currently, I take pride in my teaching profession.

NU-Thanks Ms. Turan. Why do you think it is so important to keep Arts alive (particularly the Dance class) in a school environment?

TA- I believe that art is very important for personal development. Dance classes provide a unique means for children to express themselves and convey their emotions through body language. Dance also teaches teamwork, discipline, and responsibility. Discovering the boundaries of their bodies while moving and seeing their own potential is a very valuable experience for children.

NU-Thanks Ms. Turan. Your energy and enthusiasm are always noticed in school events. What are the aspects of your teaching practice that you enjoy the most?

TA- For me, the most important aspect is that my students can confidently and professionally showcase their capabilities on stage. It is truly inspiring to see them mastering movements during the lesson process and increasing their self-confidence. At the same time, the friendships and unity that develop among students can play a significant role in their future lives as they learn to work together as a team.

NU-Your choreographies are always imaginative and expressive, please walk us through the creative process of putting together a balanced choreography for a school presentation. I suppose it depends on the grade level?

TA- Yes, that is completely true. It is important to adapt the choreography to the age group and, most importantly, to the talents of the students. For preschool children, the movements should be simpler and more fun so that they can enjoy the teacher and the lesson process. For primary school students, the nuances of world folk dances are introduced, allowing them to perform more freely on stage. For secondary school students, the movements become more technically complex and require greater emotional depth. It is essential to consider both aspects to create a balance: both technique and creative expression.





NU-The dancing choreography in the last graduation ceremony was highly appreciated. The grace, synchrony and harmony were truly remarkable. The enthusiasm you transmitted to our graduates was visible. Was it difficult to say goodbye to them?

TA- Yes, it truly is difficult to say goodbye. This is because I have prepared and presented dance performances with these students from preschool up to their final graduation ceremony at the secondary level. Whenever I prepare performances with my students for graduation ceremonies, it is impactful for me to recall the years spent with them and the fond memories we created together. At the same time, knowing that they are moving on to a new phase and believing that they will achieve success in their lives fills me with pride.

NU-That is very interesting and touching, Ms. Turan. Speaking of cohorts, are nowadays children as shy about dancing as they were in our generation?

TA- I believe that some children may be hesitant to dance at first. However, in my long-term experience, sensing the child's needs, providing the right guidance, and offering support allows them to feel confident on stage during the lesson process and in the future. I would say that the most important task of a professional teacher-choreographer is to understand the student.

NU-Personally, what is your favourite type of music to listen to? And what is your favourite type of music for dancing?

TA- For me, as a choreographer, all types of music are perfect. As an example, I would like to mention my dance titled "Echoes of the Century," which I choreographed for the first time in Azerbaijan, performed by the teachers and students of MTK, during an event dedicated to the 100th anniversary of the Great Leader Heydar Aliyev.

Through the musical rhythms and hand compositions used in the dance, I aimed to convey to the audience my emotions towards the music, my inner spirit, and my profession. Music is connected to my state of mind and mood. The music that resonates closest to my soul is our national music. This connection gave rise to the dance composition "Khari Bulbul," which I choreographed for a state-level event dedicated to MTK's 20th anniversary. My greatest current aspiration is to present the "Khari Bulbul" dance composition to the audience in Shusha, at Jidir Duzu. This would be a great honour for me.

NU-Do you have any anecdotes you would like to share as a teacher?

TA-Yes, I can share. Towards the end of the dance lessons for preschool and primary school children, I arrange them in a circle and, under lively music, give each student the freedom to show their own performance. During this process, one of my students demonstrated a few movements with an interesting and quick technique. Although it made us laugh, that movement caught my attention, and I decided to add it to the choreography of the "Madagascar" dance, which I prepared for the "International Children's Day" event. I have no regrets because, as a choreographer, I always strive to bring something new.

NU-Ms. Turan, thank you very much for your time, and congratulations on your hard and appreciated work.

TA- Thank you as well. It was a pleasure for me to have this conversation with you. I wish success to every member of the MTK community.

Is this fate, is it fate


To ask this question I have come to hate

Amazing World of Cabbage Butterflies

I have always found peace in nature. Its beautiful, its harmless and its breathtaking. Although I love all of nature, I find insects to be the most attractive and interesting part of our nature. They are tiny yet they play a huge role in our ecosystem. Butterflies, insects with vivid wings and unique patterns are my favourite types of insects. Therefore, I decided to write about a special species of butterflies called Cabbage Butterflies.

Cabbage butterflies (Pieris rapae), known as cabbage worms in their caterpillar stage, are found all around the world in temperate climates.

Habitat

Cabbage butterflies are found in a variety of habitats. They can be found in almost any type of open space, including meadows, bogs, forests, fields and open spaces.

Physical description

Cabbage worms, the larval form of cabbage butterflies, are up to 35 mm in length. These caterpillars have a green velvety appearance. Adult butterflies have a wingspan that ranges from 4,5 cm to 6,5 cm. Cabbage butterflies have white wings tipped in black.

Lifespan/Longevity

Cabbage butterflies live from 3 to 6 weeks, depending on the weather. About 3 weeks of their lifespans are spent as adults.

Behavior

Cabbage butterflies are active during the day. They fly from spring until September, but they have shorter active seasons farther north and longer active seasons in the south.

Ecosystem roles

Cabbage worms and cabbage butterflies, despite being different life stages of the same creature, have very different environmental roles. Cabbage worms can negatively impact their ecosystems by wounding or killing plants through their ravenous feeding. Cabbage butterflies feed on only the nectar of plants without destroying the foliage. Additionally, cabbage butterflies are important pollinators of crop plants, such as cabbage.

Development

Before transforming into cabbage butterflies, cabbage worms mature for about 15 days. In this developmental stage, the larvae go through four molts and five instars. Chrysalises formed on feeding plants or adjacent trash give rise to pupae. The chrysalises are 19–20 mm long and can be grey, green, yellow, or brown in hue. The duration of metamorphosis ranges from 11 days to several weeks. Late-season cabbage worms have the ability to hibernate in their chrysalises before emerging.

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
The Giver by Louis Lowry (a book review)
